The Promise

Acts 2:38-39 Peter replied, "Repent and be baptized, every one of you, in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins. And you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. The promise is for you and your children and for all who are far off—for all whom the Lord our God will call."

The Promise

How important to us?

- Named right alongside forgiveness
- Promised to every Christian
- Power to live the Christian life

Three Manifestations

Three different scenarios in scripture

- Baptism of the Holy Spirit
- Gift through laying on apostles' hands
- Indwelling given at baptism

Mar 1:8 I baptize you with water, but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit."

Act 1:4 On one occasion, while he was eating with them, he gave them this command: "Do not leave Jerusalem, but wait for the gift my Father promised, which you have heard me speak about.

Act 1:5 For John baptized with water, but <u>in</u> <u>a few days</u> you will be <u>baptized with the</u> <u>Holy Spirit.</u>"

Act 2:1-4 When the day of Pentecost came, they were all together in one place. Suddenly a sound like the blowing of a violent wind came from heaven and filled the whole house where they were sitting. They saw what seemed to be tongues of fire that separated and came to rest on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit enabled them.

Who received that gift?

- "they were all together in one place..."
- Possibly just the twelve apostles
 - Acts 1:26
- Possibly the 120
 - Acts 1:15

Notice these characteristics

- Came "out of the blue"
- Directly from heaven
 - No human intervention
- Preceded water baptism
- Resulted in speaking in tongues
 - Foreign languages understood by native speakers

Act 10:44-47 While Peter was still speaking these words, the Holy Spirit came on all who heard the message. The circumcised believers who had come with Peter were astonished that the gift of the Holy Spirit had been poured out even on the Gentiles. For they heard them speaking in tongues and praising God. Then Peter said, "Can anyone keep these people from being baptized with water? They have received the Holy Spirit just as we have."

Note these characteristics

- Came "out of the blue"
- Directly from heaven
 - No human intervention
- Preceded water baptism
- Resulted in speaking in tongues
- Peter called it "baptism with the Holy Spirit"

Act 11:15 "As I began to speak, the Holy Spirit came on them as he had come on us at the beginning. Then I remembered what the Lord had said: "John baptized with water, but you will be **baptized with the Holy** Spirit.' So if God gave them the same gift as he gave us, who believed in the Lord Jesus Christ, who was I to think that I could oppose God?"

Compare Acts 10-11 to Acts 2

- About ten years after Pentecost
 - Famine in Acts 11:28 during reign of Claudius
 - Claudius became emperor in AD 41.

- Peter called it "baptism with the Holy Spirit"
- Like what had happened "at the beginning"
 - Not like what had been happening routinely during the 8-10 years since Pentecost

Baptism with the Holy Spirit occurs only twice in scripture

- Acts 2 the gospel first introduced to Jews
- Acts 10 the gospel first introduced to Gentiles

Both cases

- God demonstrating that it was His will
- Confirming a new teaching

Philip in Samaria (Act 8:12-19)

- Philip performed great miracles
- Baptized many

Philip in Samaria

Act 8:15-16 When they arrived, they
 prayed for them that they might receive the
 Holy Spirit, because the Holy Spirit had
 not yet come upon any of them; they had
 simply been baptized into the name of the
 Lord Jesus.

Baptized, but did not receive Holy Spirit?

- Acts 2 promises it!
- Must be talking about something else
 - No visible sign: speaking in tongues
 - Had not "come upon them"

Apostles came from Jerusalem

- Philip could not pass along visible gifts of the Holy Spirit
 - Even though he himself performed great miracles
- Sent apostles to lay hands on them
 - Then they received miraculous gifts
 - Simon **saw** that they received gifts
 - Visible manifestation of the Holy Spirit

How was this manifestation passed along?

Laying on of apostles' hands

Who could do this?

- Twelve men in the first century
 - Later, added Paul
- Witnesses of the resurrection
 - None exist today

This manifestation no longer occurs!

Disciples in Ephesus (Acts 19:1-7)

 Did not "receive the Holy Spirit" through believing

Paul identified the problem

- Had not been baptized in the name of Jesus
- John the Baptist's baptism was not sufficient

What we learn from disciples in Ephesus

Baptism in the name of Jesus was required

Note difference from Acts 2, Acts 10

- Two accounts where Holy Spirit preceded baptism
- Different manifestation!

Different gifts to different Christians

- 1 Cor 12:4-11
- Given for the common good

Tongues and prophecies would pass away

- 1 Cor 13:8-13
- 1Co 13:9-10 For we know in part and we prophesy in part, but when <u>perfection</u> comes, the imperfect disappears.

Tongues and prophecies would pass away

- When perfection comes
- What does it mean???

Perfection: Gk τελειον (teleion)

- Thayer Definition:
- 1) brought to its end, finished
- 2) wanting nothing necessary to completeness
- 3) perfect

What else does the NT call "teleion"?

- "Mature" Christians (1 Cor 2:6, Eph 4:13, Phil 3:15)
- "Adult" thinking (1 Cor 14:20)
- God's word (James 1:25)

1Co 13:8-10 Love never fails. But where there are **prophecies**, they will cease; where there are **tongues**, they will be stilled; where there is **knowledge**, it will pass away. For we know in part and we prophesy in part, but when perfection comes, the imperfect disappears.

What was not complete?

- Prophecies, tongues, knowledge
- Bits and pieces of God's Word
- As they came to the prophet

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- Prophecies, tongues, knowledge
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What was complete that would replace these

NT scriptures!

1Co 13:9-10 For we know in part and we prophesy in part, but when [the complete message] comes, the [partial message] disappears.

- We have the NT
- No need for new revelations.

Rom 8:9 You, however, are controlled not by the sinful nature but by the Spirit, if the Spirit of God lives in you. And if anyone does not have the Spirit of Christ, he does not belong to Christ.

Rom 8:10-11 But if Christ is in you, your body is dead because of sin, yet your spirit is alive because of righteousness. And if the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead is <u>living in you</u>, he who raised Christ from the dead will also give life to your mortal bodies through his Spirit, who lives in you.

Indwelling of Holy Spirit

- Gift promised in Acts 2:38-39
- Every Christian has it (Rom 8:9)

What does the Holy Spirit do in us?

- Gives us control of our minds (Rom 8:6)
- Gives us life (Rom 8:10-11)
- Enables us to put sin to death (Rom 8:13)
- Leads us (Rom 8:14)
- Testifies that we are God's children (Rom 8:15-16)
- Helps us pray (Rom 8:26-27)

1Co 6:19 Do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit, who is in you, whom you have received from God?

Eph 4:30-31 And <u>do not grieve the Holy</u>
Spirit of God, with whom you were sealed for the day of redemption. Get rid of all bitterness, rage and anger, brawling and slander, along with every form of malice.

Conclusion

We have the indwelling of the Holy Spirit

- A gift we received at baptism
- Not tongues, prophecy, miraculous knowledge
- Spiritual strength to live the Christian life
